BUILDING A GIVING CHURCH

As you make resolutions and set goals for the New Year, be sure to include this one: "I will be more generous in 2023." It will bless you – and your community and neighbor!

The Bible makes clear that generosity leads to a more abundant life. Generous people experience one of those paradoxes of the Kingdom of God, where the last are first, the greatest is servant to all, and whoever loses her life for Christ will gain it.

The paradox? Generous people get back far more than they give.

First, a clarification: The paradox is NOT a financial strategy to maximize return on investment. That would be missing the point. Besides, there are more important things to give than money, such as time, service, kindness, forgiveness, compassion, love, and joy. And what we get back may not be quantifiable.

How do you measure wellbeing and happiness?

Generosity's real "payback" is what and who we become when we cultivate a habit of giving. Giving transforms us into generous-hearted people, and generous-hearted people tend to experience a real abundance of joy, peace, love, and security.

The old saying is most certainly true: The open palm holds more than the closed fist.

For 2023, set a goal to be more generous. Start by increasing your charitable giving above last year's offering, but also aim to give away your time, to serve your neighbor, to be lavish in compassion, extravagant in love.

Pray that God will guide you and help you experience the paradox: *Givers get back more than they give away.*

Effective January 1, 2023, Breckenridge Lutheran will be converting our church's electronic record management system to IconCMO. IconCMO is a database that keeps the records for our church. It allows staff and church members to utilize our church's database for communication, membership information, print your own contribution statements, send individual or group tests and emails, and so much more.

After conversion is complete, you will have the opportunity to request member log-in access. Once approved, you will be able to edit and view your own information (you will not be able to edit anyone else's information); view and communicate with other church members (an online church directory); and view or print out your donation statement at any time. The IconCMO Church Directory can ONLY be viewed by Breckenridge Lutheran Members/Staff and is password protected.

Our church members will also have access to the church directory via mobile apps (both Android and Apple versions are available). You must have a valid email address for access.

In January and February, we will focus on Someplace Safe. Someplace Safe is a nonprofit agency offering a myriad of services to victims and survivors of crime, families, and communities in a nine-county region in West Central Minnesota. Nearly 4,000 unduplicated local victims of crime are provided services each year through ten Advocacy Offices, five Parenting Time Centers, and three Thrift Stores located in Big Stone, Douglas, Grant, Otter Tail, Pope, Stevens, Traverse, Wadena, and Wilkin Counties. There is a Breckenridge office located at 115 5th St North, phone 643-3109.

Someplace Safe works to assist victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, sexual exploitation, sex trafficking, labor trafficking, and other crimes (including; stalking, elder abuse, identity theft, robbery, theft, etc.), as they navigate the social, emotional and economic impacts they face as victims on the path to becoming survivors. Accessible services are available to all clients. Accessibility includes interpreters (foreign language and DHH), live chat, and text.

Planning Council Minutes–December 2022

Present: Pastor Ale Tulu, Jill Blaufuss, Ashley Johnson, Joel Herder, Connie Jensen, Evie Fox, Orrin Ausen, Harvey Andel and Deb Berndt.

Absent: None

- A. Welcome and Call to order: Jill opened the meeting about 10:50 am.
- B. Harvey Andel presentation: Harvey attended the meeting to offer a suggestion of having a Smelt fry at the Wahpeton Community center on January 21, 2023. Harvey has already done a lot of the leg work, securing the location, figuring out the menu and prices and talking to the Valley Lake Boy's home to get recipes and ask for help with serving the meal. He is asking for help with advertising, making posters, and helping in the kitchen.
 - a. Motion: Evie mad a motion that we sponsor the Smelt fry with Harvey Andel in charge at the Wahpeton Rec center on Saturday, January 21st from 3:00 7:00 pm.
 - b. Second: The motion was seconded by Connie.
 - c. Action: It was suggested that Harvey get together a committee to help him with the project, he stated he would talk to people at Coffee with the staff. Following no further discussion, the motion passed.
- C. Devotions: Pastor Ale had Evie read a report about the importance about giving to the Benevolent fund and where the funds go. Pastor then led us in a prayer asking for God's guidance.
- D. Consent Agenda: Minutes from the October Council meeting, November updates, the financial reports for October and November, as well as a year-to-date profit and loss statements were provided for review. We discussed several items on statements and reviewed balances.
 - a. Motion: A motion was made by Connie to approve the minutes and financial reports as presented.
 - b. Second: The motion was seconded by Joel.
 - c. Action: The motion passed with no opposition.
- E. Additions to the agenda: None
- F. Old Business: None
- G. New Business:
 - 1. Pastor's Report Pastor Ale suggested moving the meetings to Sundays after church, there was a good response from everyone regarding the idea. Pastor Ale also thanked everyone for helping navigate the challenges that the Congregation has faced following Laurie's stroke last December. We all continue to pray for her health and recovery.
 - 2. President's Report
 - a. Determining Active/Inactive Membership Pastor Ale stated that at Zion Lutheran where he was last at a member was considered active if they had given or communed during the last year. We also have a group which are given the newsletter. We need to look at both lists more closely to make sure that they accurately represent our Congregation.
 - b. Annual reports are due in the Church office no later than January 11, 2023
 - c. Filling Council positions Jill reported that she had reached out to several people who were not interested in the President position. Orrin agreed to be the Vice President for the next year and Connie agreed to be the Secretary. We discussed getting a nominating committee to ask people to serve on the Council.
 - d. Updated Constitution/Bylaws Jill and Lois worked on looking through all the past annual meeting minutes to determine what changes had already been voted on in the prior years' annual meetings. They determined that we need to add C10.08, C10.09 & C12.13 (remote communication) to the agenda to vote on at the annual meeting. They also felt that we should consider forming a subcommittee to update the current Constitution and /or use the NWMN synod Constitution. The Synod has a group that will go over our Constitution and offer suggestions.
 - e. Approval of new members or transfer of members out of our congregation per the Constitution.
 - A list was passed around listing all the members that had not been formally approved at a Council meeting. Motion: Connie made a motion to approve the addition and transfer of members as listed that had occurred during the last year.

Second: Joel seconded the motion.

Action: the motion passed with no opposition.

- 3. Property update Evie reported that the elevator is still waiting for parts to complete the process of installing the new jack and getting the elevator running. They determined that the leaking of oil was quite minimal, but the insurance company felt the leak spot was caused by wear and tear and they would not cover any of the costs of replacing it. She reported that there has still been water coming into the Rap room along the outside wall. They are still not sure what is causing this and have reached out to Krump construction about possible trenching to help drain the water from the kitchen. The automated door stays open too long and lets too much cold air into the building and messes with the heating system. They will have the automatic door shut off for the winter months.
- 4. Mission Update Connie reported that there were 50 boxes sent from our Congregation for Operation Christmas Child during November. The Confirmation kids were a lot of help assembling the boxes. In December they asked for people to donate money or \$25.00 gift cards for the needy people in Wilkin County. She is going to organize a calendar for the whole year and maybe concentrate on a different mission for 2 months at a time.
- 5. Youth Education update Ashley reported that the Wednesday night programming has been going well again this year. She reported that we had almost 100% attendance of the kids that have attended this year who were in the program. Two were home sick. We love the new curriculum that we have gone with this year. Joel reported that the LYO had a Christmas party with 14 Confirmation age students in attendance. Four kids along with Lexi Hought attended the retreat at Luther Crest.
- 6. Finance Update Orrin reported that over \$500.00 was raised on the Thanksgiving tree for the elevator. He suggested a dinner again for the Council Members to get together.
- 7. Worship Update None
- H. Church Pulse:
 - Benevolence / Stewardship Pastor Ale stressed the importance of giving to the synod. Of the amount a Church gives part of it stays with the programs in our Synod and part of it goes out to global missions. During this last year we have gotten behind with our Benevolence giving because we have been operating in the red much of the time. We discussed trying to get caught up with our pledge of \$550.00 per month. We have sent off \$1,650.00 so far this year. We discussed using some of the funds in the Undesignated gift fund and Pastor's Discretionary fund to help cover the expense.
 - a. Motion: A motion was made by Orrin to use \$1000.00 from the Pastor's discretionary fund and \$2000.00 from the undesignated gift fund to help cover the remaining pledge for the Benevolence fund.
 - b. Second: The motion was seconded by Ashley.
 - c. Action: The motion passed with no opposition.
 - G. Closing Prayer –

 - a. Motion: A motion was made by Orrin to adjourn the meeting
 - b. Second: The motion was seconded by Joel
 - c. Action: The motion passed with no opposition.
