Are We Guilty of Just Sitting Still While Others Do the Work?

How often do some people within the church seem to work while others just sit idly by? Here we will take a look at some people who want to reap the benefits of the whole group but don't put forth much effort into obtaining the rewards.

"Why should you be allowed to sit and take it easy while a few do most of the work? Because just like your relatives actions, who also sat idly rather than achieve the work of the church, were denied the fulfillment of feeling good about yourselves laboring beside one another to accomplish the tasks necessary for the church to function properly.

The pressures of today make it simple for us to disregard or forget the lessons of the past. However, the apostle Paul advised us to keep in mind the lessons the Israelites learned about God in order to avoid making the same mistakes.

How Can Some Christians Just Sit While Others Do the Work?

Do we sit when we should be laboring? Do we sit enjoying the comforts from the efforts of those who toiled and worked in the past or those who are now laboring, enabling us to take pleasure from the blessings of Christian fellowship and worship?

What are we doing if we are not actively participating in some aspect of the Lord's work? I will tell you what we are doing. We are sitting on the stool of "do nothing."

How Does Just Sitting Affect Things?

We can advise against and discourage our church family, or we can encourage and persuade them to use their God given talents to serve/volunteer to complete the work. Who frequently must bear the burden on their own? Who is prone to becoming "burned out" trying to do everything? Any lack of being involved is just as harmful as actively opposing to use their God-given talents to serve! The lazy are related to the enemy.

One who is slack in his work is brother to one who destroys (Proverbs 18:9).

There is no middle ground! If we are guilty of sitting on the stool of "do nothing," then it is like sitting in a wagon without pulling or pushing! What is the motive behind sitting idly when there is much work to do within the church? Either we exercise our time and talents Gods given us to serve in the church's work and God, or totally ignore serving God and your church family of believers.

Christ is impacted by what we do or don't do for the church body. When Paul persecuted the church, he learned from the Lord as he was put to his knees (Acts 9:1-5).

When we sin against each other, we sin against Christ (1 Corinthians 8:12). We can be certain that our sin will expose us. It will be seen in the congregation's numbers serving to fulfill the work by so few. Proper growth of volunteerism is only possible if everyone does their part.

Growth may occur with inactive members, but it will be stunted, slowed down, and impaired. On Judgment Day, it will be revealed when we answer for our laziness. Do you recall the parable of the Talents? (Matthew 25:24–30).

We should certainly have the patience and willingness to assist our church to serve on boards, committees, as Sunday school teachers, ushers, greeters, handbells, choir, money counters and on goes the list that need volunteers to fulfill the church's work. All of us should resolve not to rest until the work is finished. We should be more focused on our willingness to take steps toward volunteering. What good are your time and talents if you don't use them? A waste! Come out of hibernation and volunteer your skills to solve our lack of servants to shoulder our church's work.

We should be more involved in whatever area of service we are most qualified for. Let your fellow Christian family know that you want to help and not just sit, and watch others work. Are you actively serving Christ's kingdom and a member of His infantry?

Practical jokes are never in short supply on the first day of April. Throughout the years, many have gone to great lengths to pull off elaborate hoaxes. Even the media has gotten in on the action. Radio stations report on fabricated stories. Newspaper and magazine editors run fictitious articles. Back in 1985 Sports Illustrated tricked many of its readers when it ran a made-up article about a rookie pitcher named Sidd Finch who could throw a fastball over 168 miles per hour.

Yet while silliness and trickery are never in short supply on April Fools' Day, this year in April, Christians will celebrate the wonderful TRUTH of the resurrection of our Savior Jesus.

"No FOOLIN"" ... Jesus really was relegated for execution on a cross by His own people.

"No FOOLIN"" ... Jesus was nailed to the accursed tree, died, and was placed in a borrowed tomb.

"No FOOLIN" ... He descended into hell with victory already in hand for you.

"No FOOLIN"" ... Jesus knew what He was in for - the shedding of His innocent blood for the sins of the world.

Jesus is no April fool, and with His blessed resurrection, we can be confident that there is no teasing or trickery when it comes to the Savior's loving work.

There's "No FOOLIN" us. Though the Gospel we preach may be "a stumbling block to Jews and folly to Gentiles" (1 Cor. 1:23), God's beloved children are no fools. We know what happened to our Savior. We know what needed to happen for the sake of the world. The world and its documentary filmmakers may keep trying to pass off the resurrection as a hoax — the most elaborate April Fool's Day prank of all time — but we know better.

Our days may feel like the gladness of Palm Sunday or the sadness of Good Friday. Our daily setbacks may make it seem like Satan is winning. But his are only temporary victories. Easter shows us the ultimate and lasting victory of the Resurrection of Jesus the Savior — both His victory and, in Him, YOUR victory. And that's "No FOOLIN'."

During the months of March and April, the focus of the Monthly Mission is the Minnesota FoodShare March Campaign, which runs from February 27-April 9, 2023. The Richland Wilkin Food Pantry will receive a proportionate match for all food and monetary donations.

The Greater Minneapolis Council of Churches (GMCC's) Minnesota FoodShare began its work in 1982 as a campaign advanced by congregations to restock food shelves in the 7county Twin Cities Metropolitan Area. The effort was so successful, and the need so evident, March Campaign became a statewide initiative just one year later and is now in its 42nd year.

Minnesota FoodShare March Campaign, the largest grassroots food and fund drive in the state, brings together organizations, businesses, faith communities, and individuals to help stock and support the capacity of nearly 300 food shelves.

To date, GMCC's Minnesota FoodShare has distributed over \$18.5 million dollars via the FoodFund. 100% of donations designated to Minnesota Foodshare during the March Campaign go into the FoodFund and are distributed to participating food shelves.
