

A message from the Presiding Bishop of the ELCA

"My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from helping me, from the words of my groaning?" —Psalm 22:1

Dear church,

As Lutherans, we are accustomed to holding tension between two truths. Thus the ELCA denounces the egregious acts of Hamas, acts that have led to unspeakable loss of life and hope. At the same time the ELCA denounces the indiscriminate retaliation of Israel against the Palestinian people, both Christian and Muslim.

For the past week we have borne witness to the horrors of the escalating crisis between Israel and Hamas. We also watch a growing humanitarian crisis in Gaza as Israel blocks food, water, fuel and medical supplies and as airstrikes continue to cause unbearable civilian casualties ahead of a just-announced ground assault. We see Israelis and families around the world in the agonizing wait for word about the fate of loved ones killed or taken hostage by Hamas. We are in anguish, grieving and praying for all people who are living in trauma, fear and uncertainty.

Among us are Palestinian Lutherans who are fearful for their families, their communities and their homeland. In our communities we have Jewish and Muslim neighbors, who are also facing the horrors of this crisis and its impact on their loved ones.

It is difficult to find words that suffice in the complexity of this moment, and in the web of relationships that bind us together, as church, with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land and our interreligious partners. Yet God has called us to be a people who stand with others amid suffering.

We must also call a thing a thing. The power exerted against all Palestinian people — through the occupation, the expansion of settlements and the escalating violence — must be called out as a root cause of what we are witnessing. We are committed to our long-standing accompaniment of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land.

The God who liberates us calls us to be a liberating witness. May it be so.

What's the best time to meet with God?

GOD DOESN'T PRESCRIBE WHEN OR HOW OFTEN we should connect with Him, but a "*standing appointment*" is a great place to start. There are parts of the day when we're better able to focus – times when we're most alert, more relaxed, or less likely to be distracted. When we're consistent in meeting with Him and our devotions become a top priority, true transformation takes place.

Take a moment to prepare.

1. Think of your get-togethers with the Lord as the blessing He intends.

Like the psalmist, we can be glad whenever we come to the Lord's presence (122:1), because that's where we will find "fullness of joy" and "pleasure forever" (16:11).

2. Consider setting a regular time to meet with God.

Let the following verses motivate you to seek Him consistently and approach each get-together with expectancy: In the morning, Lord, you hear my voice; in the morning I lay my requests before you and wait expectantly. -Psalm 5:3 Let the morning bring me word of your unfailing love, for I have trust in you. Show me the way I should go, for to you I entrust my life. Psalm 143:8

3. Ask the Lord to meet with you in a personal and unmistakable way.

Use our own words or the following prayer:

Father, Thank you for your Word and the reassurance it gives that you care about me and the details of my life. Help me come away from our time together certain that I've heard from you. And let today's interaction change me, even in small way, to be more like your Son. Amen

Remember: God delights in our fellowship. And while a routine tome for prayer is helpful, the One who never sleeps hears His children at any hour they call to Him (Psalm 55:17, 12:4).

"Your spiritual life goals are of utmost importance... Look at your quiet time or start one. Determine for yourself when you're going to have a quiet time and how many times a week. Don't leave it to chance. If you don't have a plan, you will come to the end pf your week and realize that other things have occupied your time."

Your time spent with God should be the most important task of your day, after all, isn't that what we long for as we await heaven to arrive? Consider your quiet time with God in this life a foretaste yet to come!

Our September Mission was health and school kits gathered and distributed by the Rebekah Circle. We received enough donations to make several kits. Thank you for your ongoing generosity!

The October and November Mission is Operation Christmas Child. Last year we filled over 50 shoeboxes, worth nearly \$500 worth of goods to be sent to children around the world through Samaritan's Purse. This year, we are collecting donations to purchase shoeboxes (\$25 for 12 reusable plastic boxes) and items to fill the shoeboxes. Feel free to take a box and fill it on your own, otherwise LYO youth will assist with the assembly delivery mid-November.

Our December Mission is gift cards for needy families in Wilkin County. Cards for groceries, hardware, gas, or oil changes make their use convenient for families and support local businesses. Cards may be dropped off with Lois or dropped into the door slot in the church office. Cash donations will be used to purchase gift cards. Through these gifts, we communicate to children and their families what the angel said to the shepherds about Jesus' birth: "I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people" (*Luke 2:10, ESV*).


